General process Clearance:

All vessels arriving in or departing from Sint Maarten waters must clear in and out.

Clearing in can be done either in Simpson Bay or especially for the St. Maarten Heineken regatta, at the Port

de Plaisance Regatta Village. (Only available from Tuesday the 26th of February till Wednesday the 27th of February).

Bring:

- clearance documents from your last port
- crew list
- passports from all the crew members
- vessel registration
- insurance documents.

All vessel have to clear in within 24 hours of arrival. So if you are arriving on Monday the 25th of February you

can also clear in at Port de Plaisance.

Be aware the clearance process is different for St Martin.

Clearing out can only be done in Simpson Bay.

Bring proof of payment of bridge, clearance and moorage fees and your crew list, passports, vessel registration

to the Immigration Office.

Simpson Bay:

Immigration Department: Located in the Police Station adjacent the channel into Simpson Bay Lagoon. It is open from 08.00 am to 4.00 pm hours 7 days a week. Note: Opening hours vary during the year. Tel +1 721 545-0031. VHF Channel 12.

Simpson Bay Lagoon Authority Corporation (SLAC) Clearance Office (same location as immigration):

Open from 07.00 am to 5.00 pm 7 days a week. Tel +1 721 5453183

Note: The Police Dock can be used by dinghies coming to the Police Station for the services of the Police:

Immigration; Customs or the Simpson Bay Lagoon Authority. It can also be used for drop offs and pick ups

Port de Plaisance:

Immigration office: Located at the Regatta Village. Is open from 10am to 5pm on Tuesday the 26th and Wednesday the 27nd.

SLAC Clearance office at the Regatta Village. Is open from 10am till 5pm on Tuesday the 26^{th} and Wednesday the 27nd.

Domestic Clearance:

Clearance papers are necessary if you are sailing to another island, even a Dutch one and also to the French side.

International Clearance:

All vessels must clear out from Immigration, Customs and the Lagoon Authority before departing to their next destination.

General process Immigration:

Upon arrival in Sint Maarten a tourist must present a passport that is valid upon entry and for the duration of stay and a valid visa sticker if one is required. See the list below for who and who does not require a visa. The maximum stay is 30 days for tourists in general.

For Dutch and American nationals, maximum stay is 6 months with the possibility to extend.

For nationals of Canada, the European Union, Australia, New Zealand and Japan 3 months is allowed with the possibility to extend.

Incoming Crew and Guests:

Crew and guests joining a boat sometimes experience difficulty with Immigration officials if they are unable to show an onward ticket and proof of financial means. Captains of yachts expecting crew and

guests are advised to contact Immigration in advance.

Other Visa Information:

Extensions may be possible for some visitors, but they are required to have medical insurance valid for the duration of the extended stay.

The tourist stay extension form and list of requirements are available at the Immigration and Border Protection Office in Philipsburg and can also be downloaded from the <u>official Sint Maarten Government website</u>.

Simpson Bay Bridge

The main access into and out of Simpson Bay Lagoon from the Dutch side of the island. The Bridge is located on the southern side of Simpson Bay, and will accommodate vessels up to a maximum beam of 46 feet and a maximum draft of 15 feet. When the bridge is closed there is 8.6 ft (2.6m) ceiling clearance in the port channel and 8 ft (2.4m) clearance in the starboard channel. There is a 5kt speed limit for all vessels using the access channel, and within the lagoon all marinas and yacht anchorages are no-wake zones.

Causeway

The Causeway, is a swing bridge that gives access to the French side of the lagoon and down to the Airport and Cupecoy areas of the St. Maarten section of the lagoon. We strongly recommend that competitors do not moor in areas that require the use of the Causeway.

The boat is owned by the local foundation Environmental Protection in the Caribbean (Epic) and The Business Point, a service company located in Simpson Bay, operates the boat. - Holders of a valid residence permit for Saint Martin do not require a visa for St Maarten, but do require one for the other Caribbean parts of the Kingdom.
